


PRAYERS OF HOPE

Clementine is approximately 18-20 years old. She is unsure of her age because she has no documentation. She has an 8 year old child who had malaria the last time ZOE staff visited. ZOE staff ensured that money was available for Clementine to care for her child and she reported that the child was better after being in the hospital for 3 days. Clementine never knew her mother or father since they died when she was about 2 years old. She works for food, meaning she must work to be able to feed her child and herself. When she is sick, neither eats. She lost her one eye to a disease and was told she would lose her other eye eventually. Even though she was sexually abused and got pregnant, she views her child as a blessing from God. She believes her child would be able to care for her when she loses her other eye. The good news - ZOE staff had doctors review her case, and with proper medication, Clementine may not lose that second eye. ZOE staff is working to ensure this is possible. She was happy to have a mosquito net. ZOE distributed them to everyone in her working group and also explained how important it was to use it. Her dream is to take her son to school.

ZOE is a distinctive, three-year empowerment program that works with orphans and vulnerable children in Rwanda, Kenya, Zimbabwe, Liberia, Malawi, India and Guatemala. ZOE goes into communities where teens and children (like the one on this prayer card) are already living. ZOE's in-country staff helps the children make an extended family by combining sibling groups into a Working Group of 60-100 children to create a new family that works together. They help them articulate dreams for their lives and then ZOE provides training and minimal strategic resources that they need to transform their lives in just three years. ZOE leads to sustainability rather than long-term dependency. The children, who often have felt invisible even to God, are able to see and hear the gospel in beautiful and tangible ways that are empowering.

St. Luke's UMC began its journey by meeting the challenge of funding a ZOE working group during the Advent season of 2015. Since then, more working groups have been funded by St. Luke's families. During a visit by a St. Luke's team visit to Rwanda in February 2016, we were able to capture some of the children's stories. Every child's story is different and yet the same. They are stories of suffering, pain and isolation. Now that they are part of a ZOE working group, there is new hope. Through this prayer card, we are asking you to make a commitment to regularly pray for this particular child and her siblings. She is just one of many so please pray for those for whom we do not yet know by name.

There are many things you might consider praying for (hope, health, food security, good crops, safety, knowing that God is with them) as this child helps her family rise out of extreme poverty. Your prayers are a way to walk alongside this child and this working group and cheer them on in spirit.
